LMH purchases **Doctors Hospital of Lodi**, now known as its West campus and begins to develop long-term care and therapy programs that residents of the hospital's service area previously had to seek outside of their own community.

LMH's **Adult-Day-Care-Services** program, operated

in cooperation with the City of Lodi at Hutchins Street

Square, Richard Sandford retires after 25 years as CEO of LMH.

Joseph P. Harrington takes the helm.

LMH inaugurates **two new outpatient units**: Outpatient Surgery and Medical-Ambulatory Care. Both units further facilitated comfort and care for those requiring outpatient and other surgeries.

LMH's Home-Health Agency and Home Med Equipment **open satellite offices in Galt** to meet the home-health needs of residents of that city and the surrounding areas.

1994

LMH builds and leases the **Lodi Dialysis Center** to **Joel Steinberg, MD**, so local residents requiring dialysis treatments no longer have to regularly travel long distances for this life-saving service.

Walt Reiss, MD, donates the assets of the Ham Lane

Urgent Care Clinic to LMH making it possible for LMH to offer urgent-care services and expand access to primary-care services for those in need.

1995

A **primary-care clinic**, to mostly serve the area's low-income residents, who were having difficulty gaining access to primary health-care

services, opens at the hospital's West campus.

A **free, telephone-advice-nurse service** staffed by LMH nurses, becomes available in the evening, weekends and holidays to anyone needing help. It's especially used by those needing help with children, those needing help with hospital-discharge instructions and those needing help in determining whether they should go directly to the emergency room.

Board President **Ole Mettler** retired and is elected director emeritus.

Physicians and hospital staff select **Edmund Freund, Jr. MD**, as their first Physician of the Year.
